From The Church

Dear Friends

2016 is now well under way and perhaps the New Year - and with it our New Year resolutions - is a distant memory. The opportunity to make a fresh start, though, to turn over a new leaf, is always with us. It might be in a very small way - a minor change to our routine or clearing out a cupboard – or something much bigger – a new career or home.

We tend to think of Lent, which begins with Ash Wednesday, this year on 10th February as a time of 'giving things up' but it is also a time to think about new beginnings. The origins of the Christian observance of Lent lie in the early church's preparation of new Christians for baptism at Easter. As those preparing for baptism underwent a time of penance (fasting, self-examination and reflection) and preparation (teaching and bible study) it became a time of penance and preparation for the whole congregation. Only one meal was taken a day, near the evening. There was to be no meat, fish, or animal products eaten. Easter is still a traditional time for baptism and a renewal of baptism vows is part of our Easter Sunday service. Do get in touch if you feel you might be interested in the new beginning of baptism (christening) for yourself or your children.

Many Christian traditions are recovering the practice of fasting both during the Lenten period and as a process of deepening spiritual discernment. There is a strong history of fasting within all branches of Christianity as well as other faith traditions.

Fasting doesn't necessarily mean going without food altogether but more usually cutting down, perhaps avoiding alcohol, rich foods, red meat. Fasting can be good for the body as well as the soul! It also helps us think about:

- Solidarity with those who cannot afford much food every day e.g. people who have to rely on food banks, mums on low incomes who don't eat at all so that they can give their children something to eat, children coming home to find nothing in the house to eat.
- Saying "no" to what we are allowed is a discipline which can help us to say "no" to the behaviours we should not allow ourselves.

Come and join us for a frugal meal of bread and soup on Ash Wednesday or any Saturday in Lent. Wishing you every blessing. Ruth Hatchett

Shottisham Parish Council

At the January meeting of the Parish Council we were pleased to receive a report from David Kemp of the Environment Agency and

Karen Thomas of the Internal Drainage Board. They have been assessing the status of the river wall that protects Shottisham and the area known as Flood Cell 4. Their work demonstrates that this part of the wall is generally in good shape, and at the southern end it satisfies the requirement for protection from a 1 in 75 event. The northern end is slightly low in places and may be over-topped, but even so Flood cell 4 would not be affected. Some remedial work may be done on that part of the wall to protect farmland on the Quilter estate. These findings mean that landowners no longer need to raise funds for work on the river wall.

At the same meeting Councillors considered the budget for 2016/17. In order to meet this budget, and ensure that we maintain the statutory level of reserves, we have raised the precept to £4250. This will allow us to fund the agreed improvements to signage at Ford Hill, and repair fencing around the playing field. We are also hoping to set up a Speedwatch scheme, and will need to make a contribution towards the cost of a speed gun.

Since the meeting, Kevin and I met with Sgt. Scott Cullum from the Safer Neighbourhood Team. We have identified a number of potential sites that will allow us to monitor traffic speed. These will have to be approved by the Roads Policing Team, and at least three people need to be trained to use the speed gun. There will be no charge for this training. If you would like to participate in this initiative please contact Kevin or me. We continue to seek an arrangement with other parishes to share the cost of a speed gun.

Vacancy for Councillors - I am sorry to report that Mark Nichols has tendered his resignation from his role as Councillor. I thank him for the contribution he has made and am pleased to report that he has indicated that he will still help out with practical jobs for the Council. This means that we have another vacancy and a by-election will be called if ten electors make a request to the returning Officer by 11th February. If no request is received then we will be free to co-opt up to two Councillors.

Vacancy for Clerk - We are pleased to have the services of Jenny Webb as our Acting Clerk. Jenny is happy to continue for the time being, but in the longer term would like to focus on her permanent role in Bawdsey.
