### **FROM THE CHURCH**

Dear Friends

In these dark days of January, it's no wonder we long for light. Even though we know the days are getting longer, it often doesn't feel like it. Humans have, for many thousands of years, found ways of providing illumination and warmth during the hours of darkness. Once we discovered how to harness and store electricity, the possibilities for artificial light became almost endless. It seems we have almost come full circle as we are more aware these days that many of the natural resources that give us light and heat are not limitless. We tend to be more careful with how we use energy - switching off unnecessary lights, using more efficient bulbs and so on. 'Light pollution' - preventing us see all the glories of the night sky - can be a concern.

At Messy Church recently, children and adults together thought about light and its importance to us; how light can help us see the way (headlamps, torch), keep us safe (lighthouse, street lamps) and show us the full picture (camera flash). We thought about how cheering sparkly things that reflect light are and how we might shine as lights in the world.

This was our first venture into more 'extreme' craft activities and making lanterns out of tin cans using hammer and nails provided very popular! Messy Church will be held monthly in future with the next session on 16<sup>th</sup> January in Hollesley Church. Children of all ages (including babies) are welcome with one or more parents/adult carers.

Light and darkness are things we don't just experience physically but mentally and spiritually as well. Dark days affect us all but for some not even bright lights and sunshine will make a difference. In January, Christians recall how wise men followed a bright star and found that God had come to earth as the baby Jesus to be a light to 'lighten' all the peoples of the world; a light no darkness could extinguish. ### Save time and money: Buy your heating oil through a community bulk buying scheme

Community Action Suffolk (CAS) can save domestic households an average yearly saving of £74 on heating oil, and higher volume users such as community groups and rural businesses, an average yearly saving of £181. The heating oil is purchased in bulk twice a month (once in December) and deliveries are planned to provide an environmental benefit, with one tanker making a single trip to several customers in a village on the same day. Individual orders can also be made if a bulk deadline is missed. The scheme provides a hassle free process and membership is open to all, starting at just £20 per year with the option to place orders online, by email, by post or by phone. ### Courses for Family Carers, Find out more for free!

Suffolk Family Carers is a Suffolk wide organisation which aims to offer support and information to anyone caring for a friend, family member or neighbour with any kind of illness, disability or frailty. If you offer support, help or encouragement to a friend or family member who is unwell then you are a Family Carer and are able to access our free Caring With Confidence courses. These courses provide information and tips on ways to confidently care for your friend or loved one. A variety of topics are covered such as effective communication to get your needs met, ways to manage your emotions and take better care of yourself, balancing caring with other commitments you may have, and looking at day to day challenges. We also have a wealth of resources which may help with a variety of issues and concerns you face within your caring role. If you care for someone with Dementia you could also access our Caring for Dementia with Confidence course which is specifically designed for those caring for someone with Dementia or memory loss. These sessions are not only a great way to gain useful information but also give you the opportunity to meet others in a similar situation. Family Carers who have attended the sessions have said they have found it useful for a variety of reasons such as "feeling that I am not alone", gaining "friendship and knowledge" and knowing "that there is help out there".
