Dear Friends

As Easter was early this year, in May we celebrate three Christian festivals which are not so well-known or observed as Christmas and Easter. 40 days after Jesus' rising from death on Easter Day, the bible tells us that the human Jesus was taken up into heaven. So on Thursday 10th May Christians celebrate this event on Ascension Day. Ascension Day is one of the earliest Christian festivals dating back to the year 68AD – little more than 30 years after the actual event and much earlier than Christmas. Our lovely east window in Hollesley church celebrates this event.

Just 10 days later (so 50 days after Easter) – this time on a Sunday – all Christian churches celebrate the festival of Pentecost. Many of us remember the old name for this festival – Whitsunday, often abbreviated to Whitsun. It has been the start of a holiday since medieval times and it is only relatively recently in this country that we fixed what is now our Spring Bank Holiday as the last Monday in May rather than following the church's calendar. The name Pentecost comes from the Greek for 50 but the origin of 'Whit' Sunday is rather disputed. It could refer to the 'wit' or wisdom that was given to Jesus' eleven closest followers when they received the gift of the Holy Spirit on this day and were enabled to tell crowds of people of many different nationalities the good news of Jesus' life, death and resurrection. For that reason, Pentecost is often referred to as the 'birthday' of the Christian Church.

The Sunday after Pentecost is known as Trinity Sunday when we explore the mystery that the one God we worship is Creator (Father), Redeemer (son Jesus) and Sustainer (Holy Spirit). All these festivals – especially the idea of God as Trinity – raise many questions even for those who believe them. But the important thing that 'Trinity' affirms is that the divine reality we call God is a *relationship* of perfect love. I will be away on extended study leave from 1st May until 31st July. 

Gardening gems from Ivan

It's been there all the time, just hiding behind the clouds. The warmer conditions and sun mean that plant development changes on a daily basis, so it's well worth having a look round the garden, greenhouse and allotment. I gave the grass a run over to trim down those long, tufty areas, cut down the sycamore seedlings and generally tidied the lawn. Plants in the greenhouse are really responding to higher day temperatures, having been kept warm at night with a fan heater. On the allotment the weedkiller has done a good job. The rhubarb is cropping well, and the asparagus is starting to show – in fact we are having our first asparagus of the season (April 16th, our daughter's birthday actually) and the normal season runs from Shakespeare's birthday to midsummer's day. Better late than never, I have planted some onion sets, and will drill some beetroot. We have some brassica plants and courgettes coming on fast, and will soon need planting under fleece. The fleece will protect the plants from pigeons and partridges and will hasten growth.

Once the soil surface has dried sufficiently and with the help of the sun it will be time to get the hoe going, disturb and kill those weed seedlings. Busy times ahead – sowing, planting and hoeing – time spent now will pay dividends in the weeks to come,
