



An Easter Season Message of Hope

When I was offered, and accepted, the role of Team Rector of the Wilford Benefice back in January, I never dreamt that I would be writing my first article in the context of the suspension of all public worship in the Church of England and the semi-lockdown of society. This however is the stark reality presented by the Coronavirus Pandemic, that requires us all to make sacrifices to our normal way of life to ensure the common good, especially in protecting the health of the elderly and vulnerable. My public licensing service which was due to take place on April 28th at All Saints Hollesley was instead replaced by a telephone licensing by Bishop Mike; strange times indeed! However, I am delighted that I have now been licensed and can serve you.

Although we will not be meeting for public worship, we are foremost 'a people of prayer.' I will be maintaining the daily office of Morning and Evening Prayer when I will hold the people of our Benefice, and our health workers, schools, shops and businesses before God. I would encourage everyone to try to set aside a small space each day for a quiet time of prayer.

Alongside being a 'people of prayer' we are a 'people of hope.' The glorious event of Easter Day, with the resurrection of Jesus Christ, means that we live our lives as people of the resurrection. Although we could not celebrate Easter Day in Church that does not detract from the fact that as Easter People, we live our lives with hope. Martin Luther King Jr expressed this hope in the following way in one of my favourite quotes:

Even if I knew that tomorrow the world would go to pieces, I would still plant my apple tree. In these testing times we need to have the hope and faith to metaphorically plant our apple trees. To plan for the future with optimism and hope and explore new ways of worship and being church. Whilst it is looking like we will not be able to celebrate the Easter Season in public worship in our churches, may I take this opportunity to wish you all a joyful, and hopeful, Easter season in the love of the risen Jesus Christ. Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia! With every blessing.

THE BLUE RABBIT CAFE

Blue Rabbit Cafe pop-up cake stall and farmstand. Every

Wednesday and Saturday 2-3 pm you can buy homemade cakes and jam, home-grown veggies, and homereared meat and eggs at the Blue Rabbit Cafe (Shottisham Campsite). You can reserve cakes (and produce)

in advance or even request a cake to be made - just email bluerabbitcafe@icloud.com. We sell the cakes in quarters so don't worry if you think you can't eat a whole one - although we have heard that people do find themselves eating more of the cake than they planned! If you want to know what cakes will be available just check out our website https://bluerabbitcafe.com/cakes-and-veggies/ or the Shottyapp. Claire makes gluten-free and vegan cakes too and pretty much all the ingredients are organic. We can deliver in Shottisham and you can pay by contactless card payment, bank transfer or cash.

We will also be selling our eggs, jams and some cakes at the Sorrel Horse Community Shop (Tues-Sat) 12midday to 2 o'clock - thank you Leila and Gary for supporting us.

We are currently in what used to be termed (and still is by those of us who grow our own veggies) the 'hungry gap' - the period of the year when winter crops are finishing and before the late spring and summer crops have really started to produce well. Despite this the Blue Rabbit smallholding still has some veggies for sale - some chard, rhubarb, psb with lettuces, radishes and spinach coming later in the week. In a month we expect to have a lot more (Claire has been sowing seeds furiously) and will be starting a small weekly csa (community supported agriculture) scheme selling shares of the salad, vegetables and fruit grown here on the smallholding. If you are interested in participating and supporting a small local business that focuses on regenerative, local, sustainable food production then email Claire bluerabbitcafe@icloud.com. We will also be selling ad hoc bags of homegrown veggies too when Claire has a surplus. While we are not certified as organic Claire grows in accordance with sustainable, organic principles - no pesticides and no artificial fertilizers. This is truly local food, measured in food



metres not miles.

Of course the circle of life continues on the smallholding. The bees are out and about more, the queens are laying and I am hopeful that I will be able to rob some honey although I always prioritise the bees' needs first. Just after the lockdown started in March our goat Elsie had triplets. After lengthy discussions their names are Pye, Pixie and Pantaliamon (aka Pants). They are full of joy and are busy perfecting their parkour techniques. Keep up to date with smallholding adventures by checking out Claire's token engagement with social media on instagram @blue_rabbit_smallholding - In a week or so lambing should start and Ellen (the goat) will be having her babies. At the end of May it will be Ziggy Stardust's turn, Claire Norton
