CityFibre will be carrying out further works in Melton, temporary two-way traffic lights will be in operation on the Wilford Bridge Road from **31st July to 2nd August**, which may cause some delays.

A12 Road Closure – 7pm to 5am

Carriageway repairs in preparation for surface dressing, followed by surface dressing works along A12, Woodbridge, between the Ipswich Road and Grundisburgh Road roundabouts will take place between 7pm and 5am from Friday 2nd August until Friday 9th August, including Friday night.

During this time, the road will be closed to ensure the safety of highway users and Suffolk Highways operatives.

Between 7pm and 5am on Friday 2nd August, Suffolk Highways will be carrying out carriageway repairs in preparation for surface dressing. The road will be reopened for the weekend of Saturday 3rd August and Sunday 4th August, and surface dressing will be carried out between 7pm and 5am during the week commencing Monday 5th August.

Surface dressing works are weather dependent, and contingency dates have been booked. Works are unlikely to take place for the full duration stated above but will take place within this time. The road will be reopened as soon as possible. The latest updates on Suffolk Highways works can be found on the One.Network website.

Pastoral letter

It is not often I get to write the pastoral letter, and it seems to be during summertime. What does the shepherd say in summertime? The lambs are born and grown, the

time of vulnerability past, time to graze, time for leisure. Likewise, the trees in full leaf, the grasses, the wayside flowers, roses and dahlias in full bloom – all have overcome whatever adversity, to flourish. The birds in the air, likewise, all God's creatures, and we humans too. Just as the young birds are fledged, so our own young are preparing to move on, as exams are sat and terms come to an end. Moving on at every stage, from University, from High School, from Primary School. I think we have six primary schools in the benefice and think how many leavers these must fledge to move on to high school. I had the extremely good fortune and enormous pleasure to watch a dress rehearsal of Orford School's end of year performance of cabaret, skits of all those groups which make up school – those who teach, those who learn, who clean, who cook, who make up the PTA. There was even an inspector from Ofsted. Year 6 came out in fullest voice to throw their hearts and souls into 'Moving on', they had learned their A B C, and their 1 2 3, had seized all the opportunities presented to them, and now they were moving on. The year is put to rest until September.

In our readings at this time, Jesus is at the height of his ministry, together with his disciples, out and about teaching and healing. Like hurtling towards SATs. Then he stops and looks at the disciples, sees how tired they are 'come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest a while.' Can we retreat to silence – which disappears as soon as we say its name? Is it as difficult as people imagine to be still and quiet for five minutes, ten minutes? The Serbian performance artist Marina Abramovich succeeded surprisingly, or maybe not so surprisingly, to silence thousands at the Pyramid stage at Glastonbury a few weeks ago, as a collaborative act of love in the face of war. And all you could hear was the wind blowing through the valley.

Whatever our reason to be quiet, it is special. I have never forgotten a film I watched years ago Le Quattro Volte, written and directed by Michelangelo Frammartino and set in a small Italian village that can't have changed for generations. There was no dialogue nor narration. One watches as a new kid is born into the herd of goats, later to fall behind its mates and be lost; how a tree is felled and used to build a shelter for converting wood and straw into charcoal for the winter, where the old gentleman succumbs to a cough and the young revel during a religious procession. Life's continuity despite its impermanence. The silence and the passing of time are compelling. It is time now for us to lie down in green pastures and have ourselves restored, physically and spiritually, after a lot of hard work, whether we have been studying or teaching, planting or shaping, time now to let go of the weariness, retreat to monastery or mountainside, on a boat or by a beach, and to rest.
